

# Putnam County: Through the Lens

As you may know, this past summer I interned at the museum and acted as curator and exhibit designer for the Native American Exhibit. At the end of the season, the Museum offered me the part-time position of Associate Director, and I was thrilled to accept! I had a wonderful time over the summer and could not wait to take on more projects! These last few months I've dedicated my time to updating the labels around the museum, incorporating a new color scheme intended to modernize and mainstream the Museum's look. The interns and I are making slow, but steady progress toward a new, overall look.

The new labels compliment a second project: updating the website! I have been working with Maria Kelly, a wonderful volunteer, whose expertise in journalism is greatly appreciated, to redesign the website layout, making it more modern and user friendly. Although it is not yet complete, please go to putnamcountymuseum.org to see the changes, and make sure to click "Calendar" on the toolbar for an easy-to-use, printable calendar that



will always let you know what's happening next here at the Museum.

My final large project is the *Putnam County Through the Lens* photography-based community art project. I am asking eight dedicated Putnam County residents to take photographs of their lives – to make our home visible! Each participant will be loaned a new digital camera, which will be donated to the Museum after the project's completion in early December, and will have the freedom to photograph whatever they find interesting, important, meaningful, etc. There will be four group discussions when the participants and I meet to discuss what it means to be a member of this community and to share where the individual photographs where taken, hopefully highlighting new or unexplored areas of Putnam County to the various participants.

The participants will choose the final images, which will create the bulk of the *Through the Lens* exhibit here at the Museum, intended to open in March of 2011. The exhibit will also feature anonymous, spontaneous photographs of the community taken with digital cameras affixed around local haunts and public areas of Putnam County during the week of Oct. 31<sup>st</sup> through Nov. 6<sup>th</sup>, coinciding with ArtsFest: Art in the Green Castle. Anyone and everyone is invited to take their own photographs of the community, and these will be displayed on a wall of the exhibit. Finally, the exhibit will feature a new Polaroid camera, which will be available for any visitor of the exhibit to take their own self-portrait and add themselves to the wall entitled *Faces of Putnam County*, thereby including as many members of our community as possible within the *Through the Lens* community-based exhibit!

Every day is a new adventure at the Museum. I never know what to expect, even if I have a planned agenda for the day! But I have loved every minute! #### "Diamonds in the Rough" An exciting Museum fundraiser for March & April

"Diamonds in the Rough" is a fundraiser that will be held in two parts: March 15<sup>th</sup> – April 15<sup>th</sup>, a silent auction on the internet of items too large to bring to the Museum; and April 18 a silent auction at the Museum of smaller items.

John York at the Banner-Graphic will be our liaison with "IDonateToCharity.org" which is the organization that will set up and carry the online portion of the auction. We anticipate this will be furniture items or other items too large or fragile to bring to the Museum.

NOTE: we will have to have a picture of every item and the owner's estimate of the

fair market value (but we will set a minimum or starting bid designed to sell). We will come out and take the picture; you will only have to complete an in-kind gift form.

The Silent Auction at the Museum will be held 4 - 8 p.m. on Monday, April  $18^{th}$ . The Silent Auction at the Museum will be small furniture items (i.e. side chairs), paintings and other works of art, pottery, linens, lamps, etc.

We need excellent promotion for both components of the auction. We want to advertize both events in our local papers, on local radio, and in surrounding area papers.

# HPS Proposing Three Neighborhoods as Historic District

The Heritage Preservation Society of Putnam County (HPS) is currently engaged in a project that would nominate three Greencastle neighborhoods as historic districts. These are the Eastern Enlargement, Old Greencastle, and Northwood Residential Districts.

The Eastern Enlargement Historic District is the largest of the proposed districts. This historic district was identified in the 1982 Putnam County Interim Report. The area currently proposed includes a few additional blocks adjacent to and northwest of the area that has been traditionally referred as the Eastern Enlargement. It contains approximately 243 resources.

Another of the three is the Northwood Historic District. A current draft nomination lists 112 resources, with only a few structures which are non-contributing. During a site visit by the Division of Historic Preservation and Archeology (DHPA) it was noted that this area retained an extremely high degree of integrity and bore resemblance to the Fall Creek area in Indianapolis. This neighborhood consists primarily of early to mid-twentieth century residential resources of various period-revival styles.

Also identified in the 1982 Report was the Old Greencastle Historic District, which lies immediately to the west of the National Register listed Court House Square Historic District. This proposed Historic District contains approximately 130 resources and consists mainly of mid-nineteenth and early twentieth century residential resources of a more modest scale and style.

A listing with the National Register requires a rigorous process. However, numerous studies have shown that this listing generally encourages both current residents and future residents to preserve the historic fabric of the neighborhood. National Register status also makes tax credits available to owners of contributing properties and makes it easier to market the neighborhood to people who want to invest in a historic community.

HPS contracted with John Warner to evaluate structures in the three areas. He has completed about 35 percent of the project and estimates a draft report will be prepared by March 1, 2011 to be presented to the Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology, the Indiana governmental agency charged with approving such nominations at the state level, prior to submission to the federal level.

As you think about your gift list and prepare for the holidays, consider the Putnam County Museum as your top destination for holiday shopping and fun.


#### New Faces: Interns and Volunteers
